# **Background**

### The Accountability Pillar surveys are administered annually during the months of January to March to:

- Students in Grades 4, 7 and 10;
- Students in Grades 4 through 9 (small schools);
- Parents of students in Grades 4, 7 and 10;
- Teachers.

Students and teachers complete the surveys online at school, while parents receive a copy of the survey by mail and are asked to return the completed survey directly to Alberta Education. Student responses are grouped within the *Tell Them From Me* survey process. Responses are collected and tabulated into the summary chart released in May and are updated in October to supplement updated academic achievement results through the Provincial Achievement Tests (Grade 6 and 9) and the Diploma Examination results (Divisional and First Nations, Métis and Inuit specific).

#### **Accountability Pillar Survey Responses**

- Responses to the surveys were received from approximately 23 parents, up from 21 last year.
  Unfortunately, low survey responses may not accurately represent our parent population.
- In Parkland School Division, approximately 298 parents responded to the survey (the five-year average for parent responses is approximately 401).
- In Graminia School, approximately 108 students responded to the survey.
- In Parkland School Division, 3,932 students responded (1,530 in Grades 4-6; 1,129 in Grades 7-9; 1,273 in Grades 10-12).
- 27 teachers responded.

### **Highlights and Celebrations**

- In nine of ten measures, Graminia School rates high or very high in its achievements
- Safe and Caring School (90.6% overall result)
  - 89.6% of parents responding demonstrate agreement or strong agreement that: students are safe at school, are learning the importance of caring for others, are learning respect for others and are treated fairly in school. That is supported by 97.8% of teacher responses and 84.6% of student responses. The year-over-year average trend indicates: teachers, parents, and students are in agreement that students are safe at school.
- Education Quality (90.6% overall result)
  - 90.1% of students' responses demonstrate agreement or strong agreement that students are satisfied with the overall quality of basic education. That is supported by 99.4% of teacher responses and 82.2% of parent responses. The year-over-year average trend indicates: teachers, parents, and students are satisfied with the overall quality of basic education at Graminia School.
- Citizenship (84.2% overall result)
  - 80.9% of parents' responses demonstrate agreement or strong agreement that students model the characteristics of active citizenship. That is supported by 92.5% of teacher responses and 79.3% of student responses. The overall five-year trend indicates teachers, parents, and students are generally satisfied that students model the characteristics of active citizenship.
- School Improvement (84.6% overall result)
  - 85.2% of teachers' responses demonstrate agreement or strong agreement that their school and schools in their jurisdiction have improved or stayed the same the last three years. That is supported by 81.8% of parents' responses and 86.8% of students' responses.

#### **Areas Requiring Strategic Planning**

Parkland School Division's Ultimate Goal is Student Success and Well-Being. The Board's Education Plan targets four strategic goals that contribute to the Ultimate Goal:

- 1. Inclusive Education
- 2. Quality Learning
- 3. Culture of Wellness
- 4. Universal Leadership

Our school's plan for education aligns to the Board's Education Plan.

• In the category of Parental Involvement: The last three year indicators (82.4%, 82.3%, 76.1%) show a decline in percentage of teachers and parents who are satisfied with parental involvement in decisions about their child's education.

- In the category of Work Preparation: 21 responses from parents indicate a decline in percentage (70.0% to 61.9%) of parents who agree that students are taught attitudes and behaviours that will make them successful at work when they finish school. Ten parents' responses (Grade 7) indicated a 50% dissatisfaction to the question "Your child is taught attitudes and behaviors to be successful at work when he or she leaves school".
- The percentage of teachers' responses to satisfaction with the accessibility, effectiveness, and efficiency of programs and services for students in their community has declined from 59.8% to 57.1%.
- 80.2% of teachers responding indicate that in the past 3-5 years, the professional development and in-servicing received from the school authority has been focused, systematic and contributed significantly to their ongoing professional growth. That represents a -10.3% decrease from the previous year.
